

Mar.9 2011	<p>The Big Wild <i>by Scott Whitcomb</i></p> <p>As Forest Manager of Pigeon River Country State Forest, Scott will share the wonders of this jewel of the lower peninsula. With 105,000 acres, Pigeon River Country provides a home for the largest herd of wild elk east of the Mississippi. It offers some of the best hiking and cross-country skiing trails in Michigan, as well as bird and wildlife-watching opportunities. Ernest Hemingway called this land the "pine barrens of Michigan" and it was fondly dubbed the "Big Wild" by Michigan conservationist P.J. Lovejoy.</p>
April.13 2011	<p>Snakes Alive ! <i>by Jim McGrath</i></p> <p>This special Earth Day program will feature the founder of Nature Discovery, a Lansing-based nature education company. Jim's presentation will inspire both awe and respect for these maligned creatures that have succeeded in their way of making a living since before the time of the dinosaurs. He will discuss their role in the environment and specialized adaptations. Jim will bring many species of snakes that live in Michigan and make these gentle creatures available for program attendees to closely inspect and handle.</p>
May.11 2011	<p>Caribou Summer – Secrets of the Tundra <i>by Kathy and Jim Bricker</i></p> <p>Join biologists and adventurers Kathy and Jim to hear about their seven-week-long canoe trip to the tundra's barren grounds on Canada's Arctic Circle. Camping alone in this vast land of millions of square miles of majestic wilderness, you will discover Arctic wildflowers and birds, grizzly bears, and other wildlife. The Brickers were fortunate to spend many days among the barren ground caribou as they migrated through the area.</p>

	<p>spring, Will should be very busy collecting sap and working the boiler by this date. To find Will's place, go west on Levering Road to 2 miles west of I-75. Turn south (left) on Heilman Road to where the pavement ends. Turn right on Munro Lake Access Rd. and go 2 miles to 10150 W. Munro Lake Drive. Look for "The Mandricks" sign on your right.</p>
April 8 2011	<p>Third Annual Headlands Park Potluck</p> <p>Owl banding and stargazing at 6:30 pm on April 8, SAAS members and guests will gather at the Guest House at the Headlands Park for a potluck dinner. Afterward, we will help Ed Pike set up mist nests and an owl calling station on-site. Ed targets saw-whet owls, with boreal and long-eared owls also possible. The first net check will be about 30 minutes after sunset. Any captured owls will be measured, aged, sexed, banded, photographed, and released. Ed will demonstrate techniques that biologists use to learn more about these nocturnal hunters and describe his findings during decades of banding. Inbetween checking the nets, we will learn about the stars and constellations either inside or outdoors if weather permits. Stay as late as you like. Up to ten people will stay overnight, on a first-come basis. Contact Jim Bricker, 231-627-4830, to reserve your space. The Emmet County Headlands Park is located just west of Mackinaw City. From the entrance, follow the signs to the Guest House.</p>
April 9 2011	<p>Hawk Watch in Mackinaw City</p> <p>At 10 am on April 9, Headlands over-nighters and others are invited to help survey hawks as they migrate over the tip of the mitt. We will meet at the Mackinaw City historic park opposite the entrance to the Headlands. Dress warmly, bring a lawn chair and binoculars, and enjoy the spectacle of hawks and eagles as they kettle high overhead on thermals. Migrating northern shrikes, blue jays, northern flickers, and others are possible. About noon, we will take brown-bag lunches to the Headlands Guest House. Anyone who wishes may stay overnight on Saturday for more owl banding and star gazing.</p>

Safe Passage Great Lakes

With one simple act, you can save money, save energy, and save birds. Turn the lights off or draw your blinds or curtains between dusk and dawn every night from March 15 through May 31 and from August 15 through October 30. Scientists estimate that nearly one billion birds are killed every year due to lighted buildings, especially multi-story office buildings. During migration, any lights can interfere with the navigation system of birds flying at tree-top level or over cities. Winter 2011 Trip January

01/21/11 Left Cheboygan with snow-covered roads, 6 degrees and snowing. It was so cold with the wind chill from driving that our windshield wiper fluid froze, full of slush. Roy added straight alcohol to reservoir and that solved the problem.

01/23/11 We crossed the Mississippi today at 11:25 guided by a great blue heron onto the bridge and greeted by a red-tailed hawk on the western side. We are making good time, stopping for the day between 4:00 and 5:00.

01/24/11 It is a no news day when the important report is sampling the McDonald's Maple Fruity Oatmeal for breakfast. Pretty good, too! Arrived KOA in Baton Rouge in rain at 56 degrees. To us, this is very good weather. Black vultures were our birds of the day.

01/26/11 In Creole country and enjoying the Black Voodoo beer by Dixie Brewing Company along with crab/shrimp/corn chowder and red beans, sausage and rice at Oak Alley Plantation. The most interesting plantation, though, was Laura, a Creole sugar cane plantation restored to the 1830's and containing the original building and several slave quarters buildings along with a guided tour explaining the area and this plantation's history. The history was documented by Laura, the last descendant of the original owners, who sold the plantation and moved to New Orleans. This is a must see on the Great River Road (Mississippi.) We also visited Oakley, a cotton plantation where John James Audubon spent time viewing, researching and drawing animals and birds for his Elephantine series of very large drawings meant to be collected and bound into books by the collectors. We didn't see much in the way of birds, however. Lady (our Husky) spooked a long horn cow who trumpeted us off the farm area. What we did see of area interest were communities completely cut off from nearby land whose only mode of transportation between themselves and the mainland was boats. This was between Baton Rouge and New Orleans on Highway 55 by Lake Maurepas. We saw a bit of Baton Rouge but are saving it for another trip.

1/28/11 Arrived Port Arthur, TX through a boring stretch of very flat land. The big deal for the next few days was the number of feral cats at the park. Lady was tormented and mesmerized by them at the same time. Obsessed wouldn't be too strong a word and for two days, she was a dog possessed by keeping track of six cats. Too windy to bird watch.

1/31/11 Traveled to Victoria. Vultures and hawks were common along the way. Spotted belted kingfishers, great blue heron, white heron and cormorants along the Navidad River, as well as a crested caracara flying along the highway looking for road kill.

Victoria is a lovely, historic Texas town with the traditional plaza in the center of town. The day reached 78 degrees and it was very pleasant to stroll around town, take coffee and bread pudding and butter pecan pie at the local coffee shop and sit in DeLeon Plaza for a shady respite.
